

INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE MISSION CANADA 2012 Annual Report In 2012, we celebrated IJM's 15th anniversary. The milestone was a chance to pause and celebrate God's goodness to us and the thousands of children, women and men we have had the privilege of serving over the past decade and a half.

While we have faced great challenges, the past 15 years have certainly made a powerful truth crystal clear: Justice for the poor is possible.

And, though it may seem simple, that truth is simply astounding. You see, over the years, we've been told just the opposite by many experts — that justice for the poor is not possible, that what we're trying to do around the world cannot and will not work. We've been told that law enforcement is too broken, too corrupt. That courts are too slow, too dysfunctional. That there is simply no way that justice systems in the developing world can protect the poor from being raped, robbed, enslaved and exploited.

But 15 years of rescue, restoration and justice tell a different story — a good and hopeful story.

Over the past five years alone, we have brought relief to more than 10,000 victims of violence and injustice — and momentum continues to build. Last year, IJM helped bring rescue to more people than ever before — and we did it by working through their own justice systems. Every day, we see new breakthroughs and win more ground in this fierce battle for justice — enslaved families go free, abused children are brought to safety and law enforcement systems start protecting the very poorest members of their communities.

And every day, more people join this fight. This past year, world leaders and church communities across the globe demonstrated through words — and actions — that they, too, believe justice for the poor is possible. Thank you for believing with us. With great joy and eagerness, we look forward to the hard work and miracles of the next 15 years. There is much to do. But we are encouraged and inspired because we know this to be true: Justice for the poor is possible.

This past year, I have witnessed volumes of these "small letter" stories sketched out in case reports — stories that, when told together, ring out an anthem of hope as survivors of violence now live and move and breathe in freedom.

In Bolivia, with her safety secure, five-year-old Yulisa* and her family are walking the path to healing and recovery. Her aggressor, the one who violently sexually abused her and left her for dead in a ditch, was held accountable before the Bolivian courts and sentenced to 10 years in jail. At a sawmill in Chennai, India — where some adults had been held for 18 years - 10 people, including six children, were rescued from slavery. Today, they live in freedom. And in a small, crowded courtroom on a rainy afternoon in Kolkata, India, a five-year battle for justice ended with a resounding victory. Two brothel managers and the man who trafficked 15-year-old Renuka* from Bangladesh to Kolkata were sentenced to prison — where they can no longer harm other vulnerable girls. Renuka has returned home to her supportive family in Bangladesh.

These stories are interwoven with stories of Canadians like you who have added your strength to our work. Canadians who have partnered with us in so many ways to bring freedom, hope, and rescue to victims of violent oppression. A 4-year-old girl from British Columbia heard about our work and emptied out her entire piggy bank for those enslaved around the world,"to make their hearts feel happy."A semi-retired couple biked 100 kilometers in one day on the Halifax-area trail to raise funds and awareness for this work. A general contractor in Alberta built a house and donated the proceeds to bring freedom to victims of sex trafficking.

We know that the work is not done. We know that women and girls still wait for rescue behind brothel walls. Countless hill tribe families in Northern Thailand long for the day when they will be rightfully declared citizens of the country they've always known as home. Children, women, and men toil in back-breaking lives of slavery, literally aching for freedom.

But today, let's celebrate the freedom that so many survivors of violent oppression have because you chose to stand with them. Thank you for helping place the pen of freedom back into their hands so they can write new stories filled with enduring hope, dignity and joy.

OUR WORK IN CANADA: 2012 HIGHLIGHTS

- This year, IJM Canada celebrated its 10th anniversary for a decade, we have had the privilege of inviting Canadians to participate in the work of justice.
- IJM Canada submitted several recommendations for inclusion in the National Action Plan to Combat Human Trafficking a federal document detailing Canada's response to human trafficking. (Read the press release.)
- IJM Canada launched its newest resource, Roots of Justice, a five-week DVD-based Bible study that features prominent Canadian Bible teachers as they explore biblical justice. (Visit IJM.ca/ RootsofJustice for more information.)
- In June 2012, executive director Jamie McIntosh testified before the Senate in support of Bill C-310, a bill that, among other changes to the criminal code, established extraterritorial provisions for human trafficking.
- Cardus Policy in Public featured Jamie McIntosh's article "Raising the Stakes on Human Trafficking" in which Mr. McIntosh advocates for the enforcement of Canada's extraterritorial provisions for child sex tourism and human trafficking.
- At Centre Street Church in Calgary,Alberta, in response to a request to stand with IJM Canada, 203 people, pledging a total of \$7300 per month, chose to become Freedom Partners.

Due to the faithful partnership of supporters, IJM Canada's revenue increased by 20.5% over 2011 revenue.
